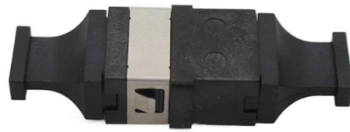


The circuit breaker in the distribution box tripped after a thunderstorm



Article Overview

A circuit breaker tripping after a storm is usually a protective response to power surges, water intrusion, or wiring faults caused by the storm.

Common Causes

Power Surges: Lightning strikes or utility switching during a storm can create high-voltage spikes that overload circuits, potentially damaging appliances or wiring insulation, which triggers the breaker to trip . **Water Intrusion:** Rain and wind can drive moisture into outdoor outlets, junction boxes, or the main service mast. Moisture can create a ground fault, causing the breaker to trip immediately when reset . **Short Circuits or Overloads:** If multiple high-power devices are running on the same circuit, or if wiring has been compromised by storm damage, the breaker may trip to prevent overheating and fire hazards . **GFCI or AFCI Activation:** Specialized breakers like GFCI (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter) or AFCI (Arc Fault Circuit Interrupter) may trip faster in response to minor faults or moisture exposure .

Safety and Troubleshooting Steps

- **Ensure Safety First:** Make sure there is no standing water near the panel. Keep hands dry and wear non-conductive footwear before touching the breaker .
- **Unplug Devices:** Disconnect all appliances and lamps on the affected circuit to remove any load .
- **Reset the Breaker:** Switch the tripped breaker fully to “Off” before turning it back “On.” If it holds, plug devices back one at a time to identify any faulty appliance
